Can psychoanalytic thinking contribute to repairing cultural and social desolation?

"Everywhere you look the cruelty of the human spirit is on display." — Julianne Schultz, 2023

"I imagine," said James Baldwin, "one of the reasons people cling to their hates so stubbornly is because they sense, once hate is gone, they will be forced to deal with pain."

In this paper, I will explore the pervasive atmosphere of deep pessimism, anxiety, and sadness—what I call "social depression"—and its impact on social cohesion I will consider whether psychoanalytic insights and what I call psychoanalytic activism can help transform this into a more creative and constructive "social depressive position," where we can acknowledge, confront, and repair the damage we've caused—and are continuing to cause.

A key focus will be on the divisive and paranoiagenic role of hate amidst rising violence: racism, homophobia, transphobia, domestic abuse, child exploitation, climate crisis, anti-Semitism, Islamophobia, fundamentalism, and fascism. How does hate hinder thought and understanding?

Can psychoanalytic thinking penetrate these dynamics? And ultimately, can it contribute to strengthening social bonds?

Dr. Allan Shafer MA (Clinical Psychology), D Litt et Phil

Dr. Allan Shafer originally trained as a Clinical Psychologist and has over 45 years experience as a psychoanalytic psychotherapist and supervisor. For a significant period he has also been a socioanalytic consultant to organisations, predominantly in the mental health sector.

He is a clinical member of the Victorian Association of Psychoanalytic Psychotherapists and has served as a past President of APPWA, as well as a director of its training program. Dr. Shafer was an executive member of the Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Association of Australasia. He is a founding member and former president of Group Relations Australia.

His group relations experience includes directing and consulting on psychoanalytically-informed group relations experiential conferences in Australia, the UK, India, China, Israel, Poland, Hong Kong, and Taiwan. Notably, he was the associate director of the 2019 "Leicester Conference" of the Tavistock Institute, London and he has been appointed Honorary Consultant to Group Relations Taiwan.

Dr. Shafer has contributed extensively to conferences and publications in both psychoanalytic psychotherapy and socioanalysis. He has conducted seminars and workshops in the UK, New Zealand, Singapore, India, Taiwan, the USA, and throughout Australia. He has a passionate interest in applying psychoanalytic thinking to the consulting room and to the socio-political world.

Breaking Open: An Ecopsychoanalytic Exploration of Denial and Possibility

"As long as Death keeps himself out of sight in our hot dark future, we need not face facts." — William T. Vollmann

As we enter the Anthropocene, we are faced with increasingly alarming news relating to global warming and climate change. This paper explores the nexus between the historical position of psychoanalysis and the current geopolitical unconscious processes and apathy in facing the climate crisis. Of particular interest are the influences of neoliberalism and Weintrobe's (2021) concepts of exceptionalism and the culture of 'uncare', as well as the different types of denial, disavowal and 'silencing'. Finally, Kassouf's (2022) work and therapeutic implications for practice are discussed.
